



### HOLY WEEK

From Rev. John: "Holy Week isn't like Christmas. The way we generally practice it, Christmas is relatively straightforward and easy; after all, who isn't happy to go to a child's birthday party? But Holy Week – the week between Palm Sunday and Easter--with its themes of celebration and confrontation, love and suffering, life and death... Well, let's be honest: That's a bumpier ride and not nearly as pleasant, though ultimately it may communicate more of what we believe about real humanity and real divinity in the Way of Jesus. This Holy Week, I hope you'll step outside your comfort zone a bit and not move so smoothly from Palm Sunday to Easter without stopping and maybe even stumbling a bit along the way. That's the way Jesus' own footsteps lead us.

#### Palm & Passion Sunday, 4/14



#### Worship @ 10am, with Children's Palm Procession in the Sanctuary

On Palm/Passion Sunday, we remember Jesus' powerful--and planned--sign of entering Jerusalem on a donkey, surrounded by crowds waving palm branches, while the occupying governor, Pontius Pilate, entered the same city, the same day with pomp and circumstance, surrounded by soldiers bristling with spears. **Children (and parents) are invited to gather at 9:50am in the Reception Room to prepare to participate in the palm procession.** But even before the echoes of "Hosanna!" can die away, we move from Palms to Passion, the story of this Holy Week, of Jesus' total commitment to love.

#### Maundy Thursday, 4/18

Maundy Thursday is when we remember Jesus' last supper with his disciples before his execution where he gave them a "new commandment" (*mandatum novum*, the source of our word "Maundy"), that they love one another. In this worship service beginning at 7pm, we'll hear and see the story of that last night, as well as share Holy Communion. **This multi-sensory service is good for families.**

#### Good Friday, 4/19

#### "Seven Last Words of Christ" Worship Service @ 7pm at First Baptist Church, 858 Great Plain Ave.

Good Friday is an oxymoron. The cross is not good. But God is. This is a time to reflect on just how far God is willing to go to love us into justice, peace, and compassion: all the way to death, even death on a cross. As a result, we are called to stand in solidarity with all who suffer and to remember God is with us in our own suffering, too. **Rev. Maddie and Rev. John are helping to lead this shared community worship service.**

#### Holy Saturday, 4/20

#### Great Vigil of Easter Worship Service @ 7:30pm Presbyterian Church, 1458 Great Plain Ave.

This is a day to remember the disciples' experience of Jesus dead and buried in the tomb, and an opportunity for us to imagine how our lives and our world would be different without the living presence of God with us in Christ, without love or hope at all – sadly a present reality for all too many in the world. It's a service of quiet contemplation and intimate prayer. **The Great Vigil of Easter begins in the dark to welcome the return of life and light with the resurrection of Christ.**


## Easter Plant Donations

**UPDATE FROM THE  
BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

Since the Annual meeting, we have a few items to report on:

We have enjoyed working with and getting to know Rev. John Gage. We, along with the Board of Deacons, Rev. John and Rev. Maddie had a day-long retreat on a Saturday. We spent time getting to know one another and talking about what the church does now and what we envision for the future.

We have been awarded the bid to lease space to the Town of Needham for a day care facility that the Town will offer to school department employees. While it does not replace all of the rent we will lose when KASE moves out this summer, it does make up some of it. They are using 3 classrooms, and an office. There is additional space that we are considering for other tenants, and hope to continue to recover the rental income KASE has provided for a number of years.

Our sale of 1180 continues to progress. We have a Purchase and Sale Agreement that calls for a closing by the end of August. The Buyer has, so far, continued to receive the approvals needed to go forward. The Buyer pays us \$5,000 a month pending the closing, which covers our carrying costs for the building. We are in discussions with the Bank that holds our loan as it will expire in June. Your prayers for a successful closing of the sale are welcome!

In response to the discussion at the Annual meeting about Rev. Maddie's compensation and role, we have scheduled a Special Meeting of the Congregation for April 7 (immediately after worship) to vote on the Board's proposal to increase Rev. Maddie Foster's hours from 30 to 32 hours per week, with a proportional salary adjustment and health, dental, and vision benefits. Please plan on being at the meeting to participate in our congregational decision making.

## Lenten Plastic Challenge

The Environmental Ministry Team continues to collect plastic grocery bags and plastic wrappings during Lent. This is an amazing first step to remove plastics from our daily lives, so that less plastic winds up in our waterways and oceans. ## LEDs reduce carbon footprint by 10%


Over February break, a team of electricians converted our lighting to LED technology. Our March electrical bill, with LEDs installed for 13 days of the cycle, indicates that we will reduce our usage by around 38%!! The overall impact on our church building carbon footprint is expected to be about 10% for the year. This puts us firmly beyond our church's 2020 goal of a 25% reduction in carbon footprint vs. 2005 (See graph: the upper flat dotted line is our 2020 goal and the reduction from LED conversion is the sloped dotted line between 2018 and 2019).

LEDs use about 10% the energy of incandescents and about half that of fluorescents. They are also, unlike fluorescents, compatible with using motion detectors, so certain rooms are now equipped.

This conversion was the second we undertook in the last decade. An earlier one replaced our incandescents with compact fluorescents and our tube fluorescents with a more efficient tube size. The sanctuary and the chapel had already been equipped with LED bulbs.

The outside lights were never converted in the previous work, so there we perceive directly a reduction of 90%. The color temperature for these was chosen as warm as possible, to honor our human and non-human neighbors, and to be dark sky compliant. With those same goals in mind and also in sync with Needham by-laws, the outside lights are on timers programmed to go off at 11pm.

There are a few remaining "difficult" lights to change: the steeple lighting and the floods over the arch in the chancel are the principal ones. EMT is working on these with Property Team.



## February Delegation Highlight and Partner-Family Letters:

If you missed the recent Reportback presentation by the February delegation, just know that our group had a marvelous trip, highlighted by many interactions with our friends and the inauguration of a SECOND middle school building, a two-classroom module that will house the 7th graders. The community shared its deep gratitude to Needham for the fundraising and individual donations, in addition to a \$4,000 contribution from Outreach, that helped complete the construction. Also a grant made in honor of Clark and Kay Taylor made it possible to cancel monthly tuition costs for all middle school students. As a result, a huge 7th grade class has enrolled, including 16 students who had had to discontinue their studies after 6th grade, due to a lack of resources. One teacher enthused, "You are rescuing our older students!" NOTE: Partner family and scholarship student letters are being translated and will be available sometime in April.

## Upcoming Transition in Delegation Leadership: Requesting Your Engagement

As some of you may have heard, the current co-leaders for both the February and August delegations (Brenda, Fred, Caryl, and Alan) will be stepping down from leading delegations after the August 2020 delegation. Each of us feels very blessed to have been able to lead multiple delegations over the years (from 5 to 18 delegations each!), but we now need for others to fill our well-worn shoes. We have one experienced person who hopes to co-lead the August delegations (Bill Garrett), but we need 2-3 others to be able to maintain two delegations per year. So we prayerfully ask that you consider how you may be called to help to sustain these delegations, to allow us to continue to offer this transformational opportunity to our youth and adults.

Each of the current leaders took a pretty bold leap of faith, when Clark and Kay asked for our help in continuing delegations. We had no assurance that we'd be good at it, but the need was compelling, so we took the risk, trusting that a higher power would be in it with us. Clark and Kay were excellent mentors, and hopefully the current delegation leaders will be as well. Please consider exploring this possibility with us, or simply join us on a delegation to see why this 32-year-old delegation tradition still has something special to offer both sides of the partnership. ## Bobby Jo Valentine in Concert - Benefitting the LGBT Asylum Task Force

An enthusiastic audience enjoyed a very personal concert by Bobby Jo Valentine on March 20 in

the chapel. Bobby had been warmly received when he sang here in worship and in a small concert in 2017. His deeply poetic yet beautifully simple music makes his concerts a hopeful and uplifting experience.

Thanks to the Outreach Committee for fully funding the concert so that all sales and donations would go directly to the LGBT Asylum Task Force. The Task Force is a ministry of the Hadwen Park Congregational Church, UCC, in Worcester and has been a beacon for LGBTQ refugees fleeing repressive regimes in their home countries. Over the 11 years of the program, they have helped over 160 people with housing, food, clothing, legal and job assistance. It costs \$30,000.00 per month to sustain the program. ## Revision of Our Open and Affirming Covenant

In the mid-2000's our church held three years of well-received and well-attended courses on anti-racism and racial identity development. We are organizing those again with a different curriculum designed by the United Church of Christ. Rev. John will lead the UCC course called "White Privilege - Let's Talk," likely with the structure of once-monthly meetings starting next fall and continuing through the program year. 
We are gathering once again for a weekly Lenten soup lunch on Thursdays at noon in the library. Everyone is welcome -church members and friends!
