


Join us as we explore the new life God offers in this season and every day. It may not be Holy Week, but it's still very much holy.






"Bless"

First Quarter 2023 Financial Update: Carol Oberle, Finance Team Chair

At January's annual meeting we adopted an operating budget which anticipated revenue of \$768,927, including \$437,000 in pledges, \$147,100 in rental income and \$145,700 funded from the Endowment fund, including \$10,700 from the Konetsky trust to support music. Consistent with Year 3 of the Church's multi-year strategy, this budget includes Endowment support at 7% of the 3-year average unrestricted endowment.

For the first quarter, pledges totaled \$179,400, well ahead of \$109,300 plan as of 3/31/23. This positive variance is largely due to members prepaying approximately \$43,000 of 2023 pledges. The church has not yet drawn funds from Endowment as funds have not yet been needed for operations. As a result, YTD revenues are \$33,400 or 17% ahead of plan overall.

Expenses are generally in line with budget as a whole. Staff payroll is below budget by \$15,000 since we have not yet hired a church administrator. Music and benevolence giving are both over budget due to timing differences. Building expenses are also over budget by almost \$6,000 due to timing differences.

Several annual inspections happened in February, our property insurance bill is paid in two installments and winter the gas bill is over budget, but will drop to almost nothing in the summer. In summary, this leaves a net surplus of \$34,700 at the end of Q1. Thank you for your continued support.

- 2 x On-Site Greeters (to also help with coffee hour set-up)




